Bristol was a bustling port city, second only to Liverpool in the number of ships it serviced. Like any other English city in the early nineteenth century, it was smoky and dirty. Beggars stood on the street corners, and small dirty children weaved through the crowds, no doubt looking for a purse to snatch or pocket to pick. Yet for all its crimes and poverty, or rather because of it, George had felt that Bristol was a city he could work in, a city that needed plenty of help.
